“Tetanus in World War I and the Horses Who Saved Lives”

This presentation will focus on the threat of tetanus during World War I and how the horses stabled at Parke-Davis in Rochester, Michigan mitigated that threat. The talk will also include a brief history of Parke-Davis and background information on tetanus and its cause.

Before retiring, Don Callihan served as the Director of Engineering and Maintenance at the Parke, Davis & Co. manufacturing plant in Rochester, Michigan. With a strong interest in history, he has spoken at historical societies in Rochester Hills, Royal Oak, and Berkley. He also edits The Museum Corner, the newsletter of the Berkley Historical Committee, and contributes articles to the Royal Oak Historical Society Newsletter.

Peter Provenzano, Jr. Chancellor, Oakland County Community College "Oakland County Community College Lighting the Path Forward"

Chancellor Peter Provenzano, Jr. is a fixture on OCC campuses as he works to infuse a shared vision for student and community success with genuineness and endless energy. Since joining the College in 2014, Provenzano has led several major initiatives, including focusing on the College's strategic goal to double the number of students who graduate by 2028. In his second year as Chancellor, he led the passage of a \$45 million, 10-year millage renewal with a resounding 72% voter approval. He balances the hard data with his personal style, gathering information by walking around OCC's campuses talking and listening to students, faculty, and staff. This approach proved crucial in moving the College to offering more online courses and degrees to address student need and demand; and access to redesigned programs and support services for every student. Provenzano has repositioned OCC for growth during a time of national enrollment decline.



Mangiapane Eulogy



In memory of Life member ... his eulogy by his children Keri Boyd and Paul Mangiapane, presented by Keri.

Each and every parent would like to be remembered in this way.

"Thank you for coming to join us in celebrating the life of our dad. I'm

sure he would be overwhelmed with joy to see all of you [...]. Over the past few weeks memories of our dad have been flowing to Paul and me, and I'd like to take a few moments to share some of our memories. As many of you know, Ben was a huge sports fan. His love of Detroit sports teams carried to me and my brother, so it's no wonder many of our memories start with sports. He was always one of the first dads in the neighborhood loading up the station wagon and taking all the kids to Tiger Stadium. He wanted us to love the game as much as he did, so he would have us keep score so we would focus on the game [...].

He always coached Paul's Little League baseball team, and they eventually won the championship. For those of you that are local, the picture of their championship team was on the wall of the stairs at the old Varsity Shop forever. Even as we got older, he never tired of finding that picture.

[...] At [the] last game [at Tiger Stadium] he asked a worker for dirt from the field that he has at home today in a plastic cube. My dad and I went to the Yankees/Tigers playoff game in 2006 where they clinched the series and he high-fived all the standing room only fans sitting in front of us the entire game. He wanted to enjoy life with whoever was around him. While we have so many memories of sporting events these are ones that mean the most to us.

[...] On the weekend our dad would make his famous

spaghetti sauce in celebration of his Sicilian heritage, and he would always say it was his best sauce ever. For the past few years, Paul and I have been making the sauce with our dad, and we filmed videos of him the last time this past spring which will now be cherished memories.

[...] Ben worked at Ford Motor Company for 41 years where he met our mom. His coworker sent an email to the retiree group sharing the news of his passing. A few highlights, "this one really hits home...the patience of a saint...he was such a kind and gentle soul."

When he retired from Ford he got a job at Hollingsworth Logistics in Dearborn. Top 2 reasons: he wanted to buy a Volvo (Ford owned them at the time) and Brooks Robinson was the brother-in-law of the owner. To this day, we still aren't sure whether the car or being able to get pictures and autographs from one of his baseball heroes was the main reason for his continued employment. When I got my job at DFCU in Dearborn he wanted to take me to all his favorite restaurants in town. This went on for quite a while and was a great way to transition from parent child to our adult relationship.

[...]

His ultimate dream was to have a great grandchild, and Conrad was born in May of 2025 which made him so happy!

Ben made friends wherever he went, as a kid it was so embarrassing that he talked to everyone but as we transitioned to being adults, we knew his goal was to make people smile or laugh. He's built a wonderful community in his retirement. He bowled twice a week with Senior Men's and attended the speaker events every Friday and worked the lunch ticket table. It was his way of meeting everyone as they checked in. He packed food for Meals on Wheels every Thursday. He joined a coin club and loved being in charge of the raffle tickets. He was so happy when I bought tickets each year. He walked at the mall several times a week and would sit afterwards with his friends in the center of the mall having coffee. [...]

Running errands with our mom or communicating with friends over the past week everyone has been

saddened by the news about Ben, from the pharmacist to the lady at the Hallmark store to his doctor of 30 years to former coworkers and especially all of his friends. The common theme, he was one of the nicest, most enjoyable people they have ever met, worked with or known.

Things we've learned over the past 3 weeks:

Love your spouse, it's the foundation for your family. Our dad loved our mom so very much. It built our close 4-person family unit which has now extended to the larger family we have today.

Take pictures regularly, not only at special events.

When traveling, add yourself to the scenery especially if you are the photographer. Our parents travelled the world, and they have bins of pictures. Our dad is in less than 10.

Don't wait until tomorrow, do it today. Call your parents, visit a friend, say you are sorry, say I love you, take the trip, do the thing you've been meaning to do. Ben left this world with no regret. He truly enjoyed everything he was doing every day and always said I love you.

And finally, our family is so blessed and lucky to have such a wonderful community of family and friends that surrounds us. We truly thank you for your support."



On Monday, February 9, at 1:00 PM, Doug Koschik will present, via Zoom, the 1957 satirical drama *A Face in the Crowd*, a black-and-white movie two hours in length.

Larry "Lonesome" Rhodes (Andy Griffith) is a charismatic, but uncouth entertainer discovered in an Arkansas drunk tank by Marcia Jeffries (Patricia Neal), a local radio producer with high ambitions. She enables Lonesome's rise to the heights of national television stardom and political demagoguery, but then is forced to grapple with the monster she has created.

This movie was Andy Griffith's screen debut. He delivered a powerful and sinister performance, vastly different from his later role as sheriff of Mayberry. In addition to Patricia Neal, the film featured such major actors as Walter Matthau, Lee Remick, and Anthony Franciosa. It was directed by Elia Kazan—the Academy Award-winning director of *Gentleman's Agreement* and *On the Waterfront*—and written by Budd Schulberg. The Rotten Tomatoes score is 89%, and the IMDb rating is 8.2/10.



Monday and Wednesday Reading Groups

In February we will explore very different, but important, individuals who shaped American History. The first concerns often-misunderstood Benedict Arnold, and the second focuses on the Dulles brothers who profoundly shaped American foreign policy after World War II.


We urge members to check the Club's website for the schedule of books to be discussed in 2026. The two groups will continue to meet via Zoom. As always, all members and their guests are welcome.



Wednesday, February 4, 2026 at 10:30 AM: Turncoat: Benedict Arnold and the Crisis of American Liberty by Stephen Brumwell. (New Haven: Yale University Press, 2018) This discussion will be led by Swarn Rajpal and Mike Basile.

Why did the once-ardent hero of the American Revolutionary cause become its most dishonored traitor? General Benedict Arnold's failed attempt to betray the fortress of West Point to the British in 1780 stands as one of the most infamous episodes in American history. In the light of a shining record of bravery and unquestioned commitment to the Revolution, Arnold's defection came as an appalling shock. Contemporaries believed he had been corrupted by greed; historians have theorized that he had come to resent the lack of recognition for his merits and sacrifices. Stephen Brumwell challenges such interpretations and draws on unexplored archives to reveal other crucial factors that illuminate Arnold's abandonment of the revolutionary cause he once championed. Brumwell's research leads to an unexpected conclusion: Arnold's mystifying betrayal was driven by a staunch conviction that America's best interests would be served by halting the bloodshed and reuniting the fractured British Empire.

Monday, February 16 at 3 PM: The Brothers: John Foster Dulles, Allen Dulles, and The Secret War by Stephen Kinzer ((New York: St. Martins, 2014) Fred Freeman will lead this discussion.)

During the 1950s, when the Cold War was at its peak, two immensely powerful brothers led the United

States into a series of foreign adventures whose effects are still shaking the world. John Foster Dulles was secretary of state while his brother, Allen Dulles, was director of the Central Intelligence Agency. In this book, Stephen Kinzer places their extraordinary lives against the background of American culture and history. He uses the framework of biography to ask: Why does the United States behave as it does in the world? Propelled by a quintessentially American set of fears and delusions, the Dulles brothers launched violent campaigns against foreign leaders they saw as threats to the United States. These campaigns helped push countries from Guatemala to the Congo into long spirals of violence, led the United States into the Vietnam War.


